



Book 1: Of the Knowledge of God the Creator

- Chapter 1. The knowledge of God and of ourselves mutually connected. —Nature of the connection.
- Chapter 2. What it is to know God,—tendency of this knowledge.
- Chapter 3. The knowledge of God naturally implanted in the human mind.
- Chapter 4. The knowledge of God stifled or corrupted, ignorantly or maliciously.
- Chapter 5. The knowledge of God conspicuous in the creation, and continual government of the world.

Our wisdom, in so far
as it ought to be deemed true and solid Wisdom,
consists almost entirely of two parts:
the knowledge of God
and of ourselves.

Being created by God

- We have limited (finite) knowledge of God
 - We only know him as he is revealed to us (not beyond a hidden depth)
 - "We can know God truly but not fully." (F. Schaeffer)
 - True knowledge leads to worship.
 No true knowledge without piety.

Being created by God

- We have an internal knowledge of God (a seed of religion) and an awareness of divinity.
- We have an external knowledge of God
 - In creation the universe is a witness of God (Ps. 19), a book by which to study God.
 - In providence/history
 - By examples of justice and mercy now,
 - The cry for mercy and demand for justice later.
